In the afternoon on Saturday, our speaker, **Alison Ellen**, gave us a very enlightening talk about 'Stitch-led design in Knitting'. We were shown how the power of knitted stitches can create an amazing variety of textured surfaces and patterns.

The illustrated talk led us through shaping with stitches, construction, and finally modular knitting and entrelac. Modular knitting involves knitting individual small pieces (modules) which are then joined together to create a larger finished item, often without the need for sewing. Entrelac knitting is a technique that creates a fabric with a textured diamond or basket-weave appearance, resembling interwoven strips of fabric.

Alison brought along a selection of her knitted creations - the designs were breathtaking as the photos below show.

In addition members were keen to buy a copy of her recent publication 'Shaping Knitting'. A copy has been purchased for the Guild Library.

On Sunday Alison ran a very popular workshop where members learned the techniques of modular knitting. Through Alison's teaching and patience those that attended felt that they had understood and made progress with the skills involved in modular knitting.

Modular knitting will work with any basic shape that tessellates (fits together without leaving any gaps).
